Finnish Recipe Corner

Porkkanalaatikko

What memories do you have of food during Christmas? Well, mine always centers around Porkkanalaatikko! My mom made it a lot during holidays, get-togethers, and when we had company over. There was never any leftovers! Never! And, my husband and kids love it too!

So easy to make, and so delicious. It's very traditional at Christmas. Here's a simple recipe for it.

Ingredients: 2 Cups Rice 2 Cups Milk (or cream) 1kg Medium Carrots, shredded 1/2 Teaspoon Salt 3 Tablespoons Butter 1/3 Cup of fine Bread or Cracker crumbs

Cook the Rice Shred the Carrots Mix the Rice, shredded Carrots, Eggs, Milk (to taste), Salt in a greased Casserole dish Dot the surface with dabs of butter and sprinkle crumbs over If you're feeling artistic, pattern the surface with a spoon or fork Bake at 375 degrees Fahrenheit for 40-45 minutes. It should be golden brown on top by the time it's cooked. Depending on your oven, you may need to adjust the time a bit.

Book Review: The Derelict Light

If you have an interest in Astoria history, including some of the history of Finns in

Astoria, you may enjoy Mike Stark's recent novel (2023), The Derelict Light. The story revolves around the 1922 Astoria fire and its effects on the town, the people and the future. Stark mixes real historical events (including the fire, the fishing and forestry industries, the influence of the early Wobblies union, Finnish immigrants, and a strong presence of the KKK) with his imagined characters and their involvement in and reactions to the Astoria of that time. Perhaps the book will motivate you to do a little research to determine what in the story is fact and what fiction.

The book opens with a body hanging from Sandborn's dock in the aftermath of the fire. This actually happened and remains a mystery. Stark. however, asks who he was, was he murdered, by whom and why, and he links the incident to the larger mystery of who started started the fire and why.

Several Finns are key characters: Jorma Olli (who dies in a fishing accident), Joseph Leino, Leino's son Arni, and his daughter Lily, who falls in with the wrong crowd. The Finnish Socialists and Reds and the staff of the Astoria Finnish newspaper, Toveri, are also prominently featured.

Some may find it annoying and/or confusing that the book goes backward and forward in time, chapter by chapter (though each chapter conveniently lists the year in which it takes place), and that various chapters jump from one seemingly unrelated plot to another. But, as one might expect, in the end all the plots converge to help solve the mystery of the Astoria fire.


The book presents an extensive list of potential arsonists. Stark provides each with a motive to have started the fire. At the conclusion of the novel readers will know who set the fire and why. But does Stark's conclusion match what actually happened? Look it up.

Astoria itself is one of the main characters in the book, beckoning immigrants, suffering, and ultimately reinventing itself.

Stark lives in Arizona but for a time lived in Astoria and was a reporter for the Daily Astorian.
